I am an aggrieved party and I am requesting that the Public Service Commission reconsider the ruling that will raise the rates on CNG.

The passing of this ruling doesn't appear to be consistent with the procedures of the Public Service Commission, and certainly not in the best interest of the public at large.


Because of the National implications, such as energy independence, National security and cleaner air, it is a bigger and more important issue than just a simple ruling from the Commission, the Governor needs to be in the loop on this particular issue and if need be also the Legislature. The Legislature could provide possible tax relief and other incentives for Questar, and possibly provide limited liability.

Utah is in a position to be a showcase for the Nation, or just another State with a failed alternative energy program. Because of the extra sacrifices of using CNG such as availability, decreased vehicle space, increased vehicle purchase cost, increasing the prices will take away the incentives of using vehicle natural gas and this alternative energy program will wither away.

It is obvious that questar would rather not be involved with the dispensing of CNG and is following a plan to eliminate it. The Commissions planned price hikes will effectively accomplish it. As I understand it the extra money would be used to enhance the CNG infrastructure, but it will accomplish nothing to have infrastructure if no one is buying CNG.

I respectfully request a rehearing.
